Rules and Application Process

General Entry Information:

<u>Applications can be found at: www.calvertcountyfair.com.</u> Contestants <u>must be a residence of Calvert County.</u> Contestants must be 6 months to 5 years of age as of August 31, 2024. Proof of residency is required at the time of registration.

*Applications that are mailed must be post marked no later than Friday, September 20, 2024

*Applications that are emailed and faxed must be in no later than Monday, September 23, 2024

*Applications that are Dropped-off in person must be received by Monday, September 23, 2024

Judging:

There will be a panel of judges. All judges for this contest are chosen by the Children's Contest Committee. Judging will be based on general appearance, personality, dress and confidence. Please no verbal coaching from the audience. Prizes are awarded in each class for all winning contest. The Children's Contest Committee has the right to combine or divide age groups based on size of groups. All judge's decisions are final.

Dress:

All participants must be dressed according to the theme "The 80's", let them dress to express the theme, be creative.



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

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

Miss Tranquility and Lord Calvert Rules & Regulations

A. CANDIDATE ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

- 1. The Miss Tranquility Pagent and Lord Calvert Contest is open to all persons between the ages of 16 and 19 as of August 31, of the participating year.
- 2. Each candidate must be enrolled in a secondary school or post-secondary school and have a 75% cumulative grade point average. "Cumulative grade point average" is defined as the average of the candidate's grade points for all years of secondary or post secondary school attended.
- 3. Each candidate must have been a resident of Calvert County for at least three (3) years.
- 4. A candidate must never have been married nor have had children prior to or during the reign (September 2023 through September 2024).
- 5. Former winners are not eligible to participate in the contest. Please note: Miss Calvert Farm Bureau is eligible to participate in the Miss Tranquility Contest.
- 6. Application materials and entry fee must be received by **6pm**, **September 6**, **2024**. These can be hand delivered to fairgrounds or mailed to:

Applications may be obtained from any committee member, your high school's guidance office, the Calvert County Fair website or you may use the application found at the end of these rules & regulations. *Application must be complete, legible and filled out in blue or black ink* or will be disqualified.

- 7. All contestants are required to participate in assigned events at the Fair, including "Youth Day" activities on Friday, September 27, 2024. Exceptions will be made for previous engagements that are specified in writing by the contestant to the committee by the evening of the orientation and creative assignment/essay. Failure to meet this requirement will result in scholarship and/or money being withheld from winner/contestant.
- 8. Miss Tranquility and Lord Calvert are required to be at the Fairgrounds a minimum of 40 hours each during Fair Week (4-8 hours each day + 6 hours on Youth Day), and their court a minimum of 20 hours each (3-6 hours each day, of which 6 hours on Youth Day). 4H contestants also need to put in their hours at the fair (showing and taking care of your animals are not considered part of your hours). In addition, these winners and their court are to represent the Calvert County Fair at selected county events. (See Tentative Schedule of Events)

B. SPONSOR REQUIREMENTS

- 1. Each Contestant must be sponsored by an individual, a club, business, church group or other organization from Calvert County (Please note: The committee is willing to help with this if notified prior to the application deadline, September 6, 2024).
- 2. Each sponsor is required to pay an entry fee of \$50 for their contestant. Please make checks payable to the Miss Tranquility and Lord Calvert Contest.

Please encourage your sponsor to attend the program on Sunday, September 22.

C. MISS TRANQUILITY and LORD CALVERT SELECTION

Miss Tranquility and Lord Calvert will be selected based on the following items:

- 1. School Transcript 10 percent School Transcript points will be awarded based on the cumulative G.P.A.
- 2. Personal Interview 40 percent (with a panel of out-of-county judges) The contestants will be judged on poise, neatness of appearance and the content of their answers to the judges' questions, as well as their involvement in school, community and extra-curricular activities.
- 3. Essay 10 percent

Contestants will be given 2 hours, in the presence of a committee member(s), to write their essay.

4. Autobiographical Speeches - 30 percent

The autobiographical speech will be at least **3**, but no more than **5** minutes in length. It will be given the day of the program (on the stage) and will be judged on the content, public speaking ability, poise, and length by the out-of-county judges.

5. Extemporaneous Question - 10 percent

Each contestant will be asked the same extemporaneous question on stage. Contestants who have not answered will not be able to hear the question or the answers.

D. AWARDS

1. Miss Tranquility and Lord Calvert will each receive the Elmer W. Fisher Memorial Scholarship in the amount of \$1,250 to the post-secondary school of choice. The 1st runners-up will each receive \$500, 2nd runners-up will receive \$250 and all other contestants will each receive a check (as long as required hours have been fulfilled).

- 2. Scholarship monies must be requested in writing <u>within 6 months of the winner's high school graduation</u>. Proof of enrollment in a post-secondary school must be provided to receive the scholarships.
- 3. The committee reserves the right to allow judges to not award first place in either contest if no contestant receives at least 80 points.

All entries must have been made or grown by the exhibitor, a resident of one of the five Southern Maryland Counties – Anne Arundel, Calvert, Charles, Prince George's, and St. Mary's, between September 25, 2023 to September 23, 2024.

4-Hand Juniors will be judged by the **DANISHSYSTEM** unless otherwise noted.

Prizes will be given for listed items **CNLX** Champion ribbons or trophies will be awarded in each department to residents of Calvert County only.

The Fair Board reserves the right to deny any entry.

Exhibit halls will close at 5:00 pm on the last day of the fair. Exhibits must be removed Monday following the fair from 11:00 am to 7:00 pm for adults and 11:00am to 8:00pm for Youth/ 4-H

Every animal and article will be handled with appropriate care; however the fair will in no case be responsible for any loss, damage, or accident that may occur.

Every effort will be made for the safety of the public; however, the Fair board will not be responsible for any accident. If the patrons do not accept this, they may go the office and their admission will be refunded.

Anyone removing entries from the Fairgrounds before noon Monday will forfeit their premiums. Any exhibit not claimed will be discarded and the premium forfeited. All entrants are responsible for cleaning their display areas at the Fair's close.


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

2024 MARYLAND ANIMAL HEALTH FAIR AND SHOW REQUIREMENTS

Ref: COMAR 15.11.14.06

The Maryland Department of Agriculture's (MDA), Animal Health Program strives to safeguard Maryland's animal industries at our fairs and shows. With an increased potential of disease transmission occurring when large numbers of animals gather for exhibition, MDA has set forth requirements for exhibitors to follow at Maryland fairs and shows. As an exhibitor, you can help reduce the potential risk of introduction and spread of infectious and/or contagious diseases by following the species-specific health requirements below.

IMPORTANT 2024

1. CERTIFICATES OF VETERINARY INSPECTION (CVI):

>The accredited veterinarian is required to send the original (white and canary) copies to MDA Headquarters within 7 days of completion.

2. LIVESTOCK:

- All cattle and swine must have an EID (electronic identification) or RFID (radio frequency identification) 840 tag. Cattle and swine with non- electronic ID tags will be dismissed upon entry.
- All sheep and goats must have Scrapie Identification in the form of an official Scrapie Identification tag, or a legible and healed tattoo matching identification on breed registration paperwork.
- Livestock petting zoos and pony rides will be allowed with proper CVI, indicating rabies vaccination status, and self-certification documents.

3. POULTRYAVIAN INFLUENZA TESTING:

- All in- state poultry must be tested for avian influenza within 30 days prior to the exhibition or originate from an NPIP U.S. H5/H7 Avian Influenza Clean flock.
- All out-of-state poultry must be tested for avian influenza within 21 days prior to the exhibition or originate from an NPIP U.S. H5/H7 Avian Influenza Clean flock.

Maryland Law provides penalties for violations of Animal Health Law and Regulations.

LIVESTOCK AND POULTRY FAILING TO MEET COMPLETE DOCUMENTATION OF ALL REQUIREMENTS WILL BE DENIED ENTRY OR REMOVED FROM THE EXHIBITION, - "REJECTED," SEE ANIMAL REJECTION POLICY UNDER GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR EXHIBITORS.

REQUIREMENTS FOR SPONSORS OF A LIVESTOCK/POULTRY EXHIBITION (COMAR 15.11.14.05)

1. Notification: Exhibit sponsors must notify the Maryland Department of Agriculture (MDA), Animal Health Program Headquarters, 50 Harry S. Truman Parkway, Annapolis, MD 21401, of intent to sponsor an event that includes the exhibition of livestock or poultry no less than 30 days before the proposed event. Please

fill out all contact information correctly, to include a phone number and email address. Animal arrival times MUST be provided to ensure coverage for entry. Please call 410-841-5810 to request an EXHIBITION NOTIFICATION FORM or go to MDA's website: https://mda.maryland.gov/animalhealth/pages/fairs-shows.aspx

- 2. Reporting: Sponsors must report to the Department any animal from the exhibition suspected of having or showing obvious, apparent, or known signs of a contagious or infectious disease and/or deaths; and exclude from the exhibition premises any animals having obvious, apparent, or known signs of a contagious or infectious disease. A summary of all disease events shall be provided to MDA, in the form of an ANIMAL INCIDENT REPORT. Call 410-841-5810 to request an ANIMAL INCIDENT REPORT FORM or go to MDA's website: http://mda.maryland.gov/AnimalHealth/Pages/Fairs- Shows.aspx
- 3. Records: Exhibit sponsors must maintain a report of the owner, premises location, and species of all animals attending the exhibition and provide this report unon request to MDA.
- 4 Exemptions: Exemptions of this regulation may be granted. (Refer to COMAR 15.11.14.05)

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR EXHIBITORS OF ALL ANIMAL SPECIES (COMAR 15.11.14.04-06)

Exhibitors at state, county, and district fairs, along with other livestock exhibitions, expositions, rodeos, shows, and swap meets are required to comply with regulatory provisions of the State of Maryland relating to animal health as noted in COMAR 15.11.14.04-06. Requirements apply to all livestock and poultry: Livestock

is defined as those species of animals used for human food or fiber or those species of animals used for service to humans. This includes but is not limited to cattle,

nets, Poultry is defined as any living domestic bird raised for food or other purposes including, but not limited to, chicken, turkeys, ostriches, emus, rheas, casso

1. **DOCUMENTATION:** Documentation is required for entry of all livestock and poultry and is described below. Examples of forms can be obtained by

visiting the Animal Health website at: https://mda.maryland.gov/AnimalHealth/Pages/Fairs-Shows.aspx

For out-of-state animals, see species specific out of state requirements. Upon request, a person who exhibits livestock shall present for inspection all reports, test charts, and appropriate health certificates required to accompany the livestock and poultry.

- CERTIFICATE OF VETERINARY INSPECTION is required for most entries.
 a.MARYLAND ENTRIES: All Maryland entries must be accompanied by a Maryland Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) for show, except poultry, equine and rabbits.
 - The Maryland CVI is valid for 120 days for fairs and shows, providing that the status of the herd or animal(s) does not change.
 - The Maryland CVI is a legible record, made on an official Maryland State form, issued by a Maryland accredited veterinarian, issued for animals being shown within the state and not crossing a state line, which shows that the animals listed thereon meet the health requirements of the state of Maryland.
 - The Maryland CVI must be completed and signed by a Maryland accredited veterinarian using the properly selected report
 on the CVI form. Each animal must be properly identified on the CVI. The veterinarian must select if this document is for fair and
 exhibition season, sale or other (with explanation).
 - The veterinarian is required to send the original (white and canary) copies to MDA Headquarters within 7 days of completion, the middle (pink) transport copy is to be retained by the owner and should accompany livestock during travel. The last (goldenrod) copy is for the veterinarian's records.
 - OUT-OF-STATE ENTRIES: All out-of-state entries must be accompanied by an Interstate Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, except poultry and rabbits.
 - The Interstate CVI is valid for no more than 30 days from the date of inspection.
 - An Interstate CVI must be legible, made on an official form of the state of origin, issued by an accredited veterinarian, and issued
 for animals being imported to this state within 30 days before the entry of the animals, which shows that the animals listed thereon
 meet the health requirements of the state of Maryland.
- SELF-CERTIFICATION: A completed Self-Certification is required for all entries except for equine entering equine-only events. Self-Certification forms must be filled out within 24 hours prior to loading and presented upon request to the designated representative.
 - A Self-Certification is an official Maryland document signed by the owner/caretaker/ transporter stating that the animals presented for exhibition are not showing any signs of or having recent exposure to (within 21 days) infectious or contagious diseases.
 - Self-Certification forms are species-specific for livestock (ruminants, swine), equine, poultry and rabbits. These forms are available on MDA's Animal Health website: https://mda.maryland.gov/AnimalHealth/Pages/Fairs-Shows.aspx
- 4. TEST REPORT FORMS. Testing is required for some species, and if so, a test report form will be required unless otherwise documented on the CVI. See species-specific requirements for details of testing and test report requirements. Examples of test reports are shown below:
 - Avian Influenza Testing Report
 - Pullorum-Typhoid Testing Report
 - Coggins Test Report (Equine Infectious Anemia)
 - Tuberculosis Test Report
- 5. MARYLAND POULTRY PREMISES IDENTIFICATION All Maryland premises with poultry are required to be registered with the Maryland Department of Agriculture. The Poultry Premises number must be noted on the Test Report or other documenta tion of NPIP U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid and U.S. H5/ H7 Avian Influenza Clean or State H5/H7 Monitored status.
- **6. ANIMAL REJECTION POLICY.** Animals may be rejected from an exhibition, either denied entry or removed from the exhibition, as described below:
 - a. FAILURE TO PROVIDE COMPLETED DOCUMENTATION IS GROUNDS FOR REJECTION.
 - b. FOR A SKIN LESION SUSPICIOUS OF RINGWORM TO BE CONSIDERED NO LONGER CONTAGIOUS TO OTHER ANIMALS OR PEOPLE, NEW WOOL OR HAIR MUST COMPLETELY COVER THAT LESION.
 - c. Livestock with clinical signs of infectious or contagious diseases or external parasites are not permitted entry or allowed to remain at the exhibition. Clinical signs include but are not limited to active lesions of ringworm with resulting loss of hair, sore mouth, sore nose, caseous lymphadenitis, prolapse, mange, or multiple warts easily visible without close examination.
 - d. Suspicion of communicable disease is adequate grounds for rejection. Confirmed diagnosis is not required, since timely removal of suspicious animals is required by law to protect the remaining animals.
 - e. Exposed animals may be rejected: If it is believed that there is a potentially serious communicable disease present, all animals originating with the suspect animal may be rejected. Vesicular diseases are of particular concern.
 - f. All decisions are final.
 - g_{\ast} $\,$ All parties involved will be notified of all rejections, including exhibit sponsors and supervisors.
 - h. Animal rejections can be made by MDA Animal Health veterinarians or field inspectors, private veterinarians contracted by the show, Maryland Extension employees, or individuals designated by the fair or show as a 'responsible person.

SPECIES-SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS

In addition to the general requirements above, specific requirements by species are shown for the following species:

- Cattle
- Sheep
- Horses, Ponies, Mules and other Equidae
- Rabbits

- Swine
- Goats
- Poultry
- Camelids

Fair and Show Requirements: Cattle

ALL CATTLE

IDENTIFICATION: INDIVIDUAL IDENTIFICATION OF EACH ANIMAL SHALL BE AN RFID OFFICIAL EAR TAG.

Rodeo Cattle must have official individual ID that is recognized by the USDA. Rodeo Cattle are NOT allowed to commingle with any other cattle at the exhibition.

Maryland Cattle

Brucellosis: Maryland is a Bovine Brucellosis Class-Free State. Brucellosis testing is not required for Maryland cattle.

Tuberculosis: Maryland is an Accredited Tuberculosis-Free State. Tuberculin test is not required for Maryland cattle.

Immunization: Bovine Respiratory Disease Complex vaccination is required for all Maryland cattle to include Bovine Respiratory Syncytial Virus, Bovine Viral Diarrhea virus, Infectious Bovine Rhinotracheitis and Parainfluenza. Leptospirosis vaccination is recommended.

Out-of-State Cattle

Brucellosis:

- 1. Bovine Brucellosis Class-Free State, Region or Zone
 - a. No brucellosis test required.
- 2. Non-Bovine Brucellosis Class-Free State, Region or Zone
 - a. Official vaccinates under 24 months old with vaccination dates recorded on the Interstate CVI permitted, or
 - b. Test negative within 30 days before entry.

Tuberculosis:

- 1. Accredited Tuberculosis-Free State, Region or Zone
 - a. No tuberculin test required.

2. Modified Accredited Advanced or lower Tuberculosis Free Areas or States (Not TB Free)

- a. All cattle over 6 months of age shall comply with the following:
 - i. Cattle must originate from a herd where a complete herd test was conducted within the past 12 months; progeny from such herds born since that test may be imported without a tuberculin test, or
 - ii. Any individual animal, over 6 months of age, entering Maryland must have a negative tuberculin test within 60 days before import.
- b. Status of herd and area must be shown on certificate.

Fair and Show Requirements: Swine

ALL SWINE

IDENTIFICATION: INDIVIDUAL IDENTIFICATION OF EACH ANIMAL SHALL BE AN RFID OFFICIAL EAR TAG.

Maryland Swine

Brucellosis: Maryland is a Brucellosis Class-Free State. Brucellosis testing is not required for Maryland swine.

Pseudorabies: Maryland is a Pseudorabies Stage V state. Pseudorabies testing is not required for Maryland swine.

Immunization: Leptospirosis vaccination is recommended.

Out-of-State Swine

Brucellosis: All swine, except barrows, 6 months of age and older shall be negative on an official test for brucellosis within 30 days prior to exhibition entry, or originate directly from a validated brucellosis-free herd or brucellosis-free state.

Pseudorabies: Swine over 6 months of age shall be negative on an official test for pseudorabies conducted within 30 days prior to exhibition entry, or originate immediately and directly from a Qualified Pseudorabies Negative herd or Stage 4 or Stage 5 Pseudorabies-Free

Immunization: Leptospirosis vaccination is recommended.

Fair and Show Requirements: Sheep and Goats

ALL SHEEP

Identification for Sheep: All sheep must be officially scrapie-identified. Official identification for sheep includes the following:

- USDA-approved scrapie ear tags;
- 2. Legible registration tattoos, for which the breed registration paper shall contain the registry premises or flock tattoo prefix that is linked to the APHIS-assigned PIN and flock ID number of the flock of birth, if breed registry is approved by APHIS; or
- 3. Legible tattoos consisting of an individual animal number unique within the flock in one ear and the official scrapie premises identification number (flock ID) in the other ear, except where the tail web or flank may be used for earless animals or animals with damaged ears; must be accompanied by an owner statement.
- 4. A microchip ID with official scrapie identification is acceptable if the owner provides the reader.

Out-of-State Sheep

No additional requirements.

Market Lambs

It is recommended that all lambs be slick shorn prior to entry for inspection for club lamb fungus.

ALL GOATS

Identification for Goats: All goats must be officially scrapie-identified. Official identification for goats includes the following:

- 1. USDA-approved scrapie ear tags;
- 2. Legible registration tattoos, for which the breed registration paper shall contain the registry premises or flock tattoo prefix that is linked to the APHIS-assigned PIN and flock ID number of the flock of birth, if breed registry is approved by APHIS; or
- 3. Legible tattoos consisting of an individual animal number unique within the herd in one ear and the official scrapie premises identification number (flock ID) in the other ear, except where the tail web or flank may be used for earless animals or animals with damaged ears; must be accompanied by an owner statement.
- 4. A microchip ID with official scrapie identification is acceptable if the owner provides the reader.
- 5. RFID tags.

Maryland Goats

Brucellosis: Maryland is a Brucellosis Class-Free State. Brucellosis testing is not required for Maryland goats. Tuberculosis: Maryland is an Accredited Tuberculosis-Free State. Tuberculin test is not required for Maryland goats.

Out-of-State Goats

Tuberculosis:

- 1. Accredited Tuberculosis-Free States, Region or Zone: No tuberculin test required.
- 2. Modified Accredited Advanced or lower Tuberculosis Free Areas or States (Not TB Free)
 - a. All goats over 6 months of age shall comply with the following:
 - i. Goats must originate from herds in which all animals are tested negative within the past 12 months; progeny from such herds born since that test, may be imported without a tuberculin test, or
 - ii. Any individual animal entering Maryland must have a negative tuberculin test within 60 days before import.
 - b. Status of herd and area must be shown on certificate.

Fair and Show Requirements: Horses, Ponies, Mules and Other Equidae

ALL EOUINE

Identification: Individual official identification shall include the following as applicable: EIA test report with photo or drawing of the animal, tattoo, brand, or microchip. *Animals using tattoos or brands for official identification must be accompanied by the breed registration papers*. Equine Infectious Anemia (Coggins) Testing: All equine for exhibition shall be accompanied by a valid Coggins Test done within 12 months prior to exhibition entry.

Self-Certification Requirement and Exemption: Exhibitor's Self Certification of Animal Health is required for each equine entering a fair/show-type event where multiple livestock species are present. The form must be available for inspection if requested. Those participating in equine-only shows and events are exempt from this requirement; however, it is good practice to thoroughly double check the health and skin condition of the animal before departing for the event. The form provides an easy checklist to do this. Exhibitors may not bring an animal having apparent or known signs of a contagious or infectious disease to a show.

Maryland Equine

- 1. All horses and other Equidae, 9 months of age and older, shall be accompanied by a negative test for equine infectious anemia (EIA) made within the 12 months before the date of the event. A copy of this test shall accompany every animal.
- 2. A Maryland CVI is not required for Maryland equine.

Out-of-State Equine

All horses and other Equidae, 9 months of age and older, shall be accompanied by a negative test for equine infectious anemia (EIA) made within the 12 months before the date of the event. A copy of this test shall accompany every animal.

All horses and other Equidae shall be accompanied by a CVI issued within 30 days prior to entry. An

Interstate CVI must be legible, made on an official form from the state of origin, issued by an accredited veterinarian, and issued for animals being imported to this state within 30 days before the entry of the animals, which shows that the animals listed thereon meet the health requirements of the state of Maryland.

Fair and Show Requirements: Poultry

ALL POULTRY

- 1. PRIVATE SALES WILL BE ALLOWED WITH PROPER DOCUMENTATION OF THE SALE BY THE EXHIBITION SPONSOR AND MAINTAINED FOR ONE YEAR.
- 2. IDENTIFICATION: Poultry entering an exhibition shall be identified with a numbered leg or wing band.
- 3. ALL POULTRY EXHIBITORS SHALL COMPLETE A POULTRY EXHIBITOR'S SELF- CERTIFICATION OF ANIMAL HEALTH.
- 4. DOCUMENTATION of test results must be provided on MDA-E06 and MDA-E20, VS Form 9-2, VS Form 9-3 or comparable form approved by the State Veterinarian.

Maryland Poultry

- 1. Premises Registration: All poultry exhibitors originating from Maryland must have valid proof of a registered Maryland Poultry Premises ID Number
- 2. <u>Avian Influenza (AI) Testing Requirements</u>: All poultry, <u>including wild birds</u> except pigeons and doves, shown at public exhibitions in this state shall meet one of the following AI testing requirements:

- i. Originate directly from an NPIP U.S. H5/H7 Avian Influenza Clean Flock as defined in Title 9 of the Code of Federal Regulations, or from a State Avian Influenza Monitored Flock as defined by the state of origin, OR
- ii. Have a negative avian influenza test conducted on at least 15 birds from their flock (or complete flock if fewer than 15 birds) within 30 days prior to event and remain segregated from all birds of unknown or positive avian influenza test status.
- 3. Salmonella Pullorum-Typhoid Testing Requirements: All poultry, except waterfowl, wild birds, pigeons and doves, shown at public exhibitions in this state shall meet one or more of the following requirements:
- i. Originate directly from an NPIP U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean flock as defined in Title 9 of the Code of Federal Regulations (and there was no break in the chain of ownership by NPIP participants),
- ii Have a negative official test for Salmonella Pullorum-Typhoid within 90 days before fair, exhibition, exposition, or show and remain segregated from all poultry of unknown or positive Salmonella Pullorum-Typhoid test status.

Out-of- State Poultry

- 1. Avian Influenza (AI) Testing Requirements: All poultry, including wild birds except pigeons and doves, shown at public exhibitions in this state shall meet one of the following AI testing requirements:
 - i. Originate directly from an NPIP U.S. H5/H7 Avian Influenza Clean Flock as defined in Title 9 of the Code of Federal Regulations, or from a State Avian Influenza Monitored Flock as defined by the state of origin, OR
 - ii. Have a negative avian influenza test conducted on at least 30 birds from their flock (or complete flock if fewer than 30 birds) within 21 days prior to the event and remain segregated from all birds of unknown or positive avian influenza test status.
- 2. Salmonella Pullorum-Typhoid Testing Requirements: All poultry except waterfowl, wild birds, pigeons and doves shown at public exhibitions in this state shall meet one or more of the following requirements:
 - i. Originate directly from a U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean flock as defined in Title 9 of the Code of Federal Regulations (and there was no break in the chain of ownership by NPIP participants),
 - ii. Have a negative official test for Salmonella Pullorum-Typhoid within 90 days before fair, exhibition, exposition, or show and remain segregated from all poultry of unknown or positive Salmonella Pullorum-Typhoid test status.

Fair and Show Requirements: Rabbits ALL RABBITS

- 1. See Rabbit Waiver: Rabbits are not required to have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.
- 2. Identification: Individual identification of each animal shall be a tag, tattoo, or microchip, if the exhibitor provides the reader.
- 3. All rabbit exhibitors shall complete a Rabbit Exhibitor's Self Certification of Animal Health.

 - ii. Any individual animal, over 6 months of age, entering Maryland must have a negative tuberculin test within 60 days before
- b. Status of herd and area must be shown on certificate.

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



- 2. Mail all entries to: Calvert County Fair, Attention: Poultry/Rabbit Dept, P.O. Box 224, Barstow, MD 20610.
- 3. To show birds in the State of Maryland, you must provide a Maryland Domestic Poultry & Exotic Bird Premises Registration ID number.
- 4. Cooping-in day is Tuesday of fair week from noon-8 p.m.
- 5. All exhibits must be removed from the Poultry Building between 6 and 8 p.m. on Sunday after the fair closes.
- 6. Any exhibits still remaining after 8 p.m. will become the property of the Poultry and Rabbit Department Chairperson to handle as they see fit.
- 7. All birds must be Avain Flu and Pullorum tested and banded, and an original copy of test papers to be held until after the show, with the exception of pigeons and doves. For more information contact John Brady, (410) 610-4580 or Amy Brady, 443-975-0986.
- 8. All species of fowl entered in the fair will be subject to daily inspection by a representative of the Maryland Livestock Sanitary Service. All birds showing symptoms of any disease will be disqualified and must be removed immediately from the building for the duration of the fair, and isolated, as directed by the Livestock Sanitary Service representative. Such birds may not be returned to the building for the duration of the fair. When notified of any sick species you must remove them within 24 hours.
- 9. State whether entry is Large Fowl Poultry, Bantams, Ducks, Geese, Pigeons, Turkeys or Pheasants. If not, they will be entered as Large Fowl and judged that way. Only recognized breeds and varieties will be accepted. Give name and variety as shown in the American Poultry Association "Standard of Perfection".
- 10. The same bird cannot compete in both the Open and Youth classes.
- 11. All birds shown must be the property of the exhibitor at least 3 months before the fair.
- 12. Specimens will be fed and watered and cared for by the Poultry Department staff.
- 13. Judging will be by comparison and governed by the American Poultry Association "Standard of Perfection". All specimens shall be exhibited in their natural conditions with the exception of Game and Game Bantams.
- 14. Each exhibitor will be limited to a maximum of 40 birds or 40 rabbits.
- 15. No advertising cards or inscriptions will be allowed on coops until after judging has been completed.
- 16. No Trios or pairs will be shown.
- 17. No exhibitor may enter more than one exhibit per class (same breeds).
- 18. Any animals sold by Exhibitor will be the sole responsibility of the seller and buyer. Calvert County Fair, Inc. will not be held responsible for any difficulties between the seller and the buyer.
- 19. The management will not be responsible for loss by fire or otherwise, but will exercise all vigilance in the care of exhibits. The greatest care will be taken of all specimens, but the Fair will not be responsible for accidents, mistake, loss, damage, from whatever arises. 

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

- All honey and hive products must be the property of the exhibitor and must have been produced, gathered, and ripened in a natural way by honey bees, in the exhibitors hives within the 15-month period prior to entry. For proper judging, honey exhibits must be presented in 3 glass Queenline classic, or other 1-lb flat-faced honey jars unless otherwise noted. One entry per household per class. No exhibitors name or business logo shall be visible on any entry.
- Competent MDState judging will be provided. Judges may withhold prizes for insufficient merit and remove from public view any entry or part thereof which in the judge's opinion discredits the exhibit. A copy of the Standards for Honey Judging in Maryland will be available upon request. A copy of the judge's score sheet will be provided for each entry at the close of the fair.
- Frame of honey must be supported vertically in a sealed rigid display case with transparent windows for viewing the entire comb portion.
- All comb honey must be packed in clear, plastic, 4-1/8 square comb boxes or in clear, plastic, approx. 4-inch round comb containers for viewing the entire comb portion.
- Propolis must weigh at least 2 oz, be free of wax, honey, and other debris, and be rolled flat between two wax paper sheets or in a plastic bag.
- Bee related photographs must be: A single black and white or color print, 5"x 7"minimum, suitably framed. Can be matted or mounted to enhance exhibit, pertaining to be ekeeping.
- Bee craft includes any art or craft depicting honey bees/beekeeping activities.
- Gift packs must include one or more products of the hives, but may also include other items that enhance the appeal or promote the use of hive products. Gift packs should be suitable for personal

gift use regardless of commercial applications. The gift pack should be a box, basket, or other suitable container. Themed items a plus.

- Cosmetics must have product name and recipe card. Must contain products from the hive-beeswax, honey, propolis etc.
- Class 29: May include pictures but may not include beekeepers' equipment, tools, observation hives, bakery products, cannedgoods, or honey.

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






This includes inspecting cut flower and sprays carefully and inspecting container grown plants for cleanliness (including the container), unsightly leaves or stems and insects.

Exhibitors are encouraged to inconspicuously mark personal property with name and address. The flower department will exercise the utmost care, but cannot be responsible for loss or damage to exhibits or containers.

In order to expedite the entry process, please arrive prior to 6:00 pm if you have more than 10 entries. The entry process can also be expedited if exhibitors fill out all entry tags and entry forms before coming to the fairgrounds on entry day. Entry tags and forms can be picked up at the fairgrounds.

Entries must be removed on the Monday following Fair Week between 11:00 am and 7:00 pm. Entries cannot be removed before that Monday. Exhibitors who do not claim their entries and premiums that day forfeit any premiums.

Exhibitors may enter only one entry in any class or subdivision of a class, unless otherwise specified.

YOUTH GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

- 1. The Youth Department is open to **ALL YOUTH**(4-Hmembers and non-4-Hmembers) in the five (5) Southern Maryland Counties Anne Arundel, Calvert, Charles, Prince George's and St Mary's, unless otherwise noted.
- 2. All exhibitors must be 5 to 18 years old as of January 1 of the current year.
- 3. Livestock competitions, contests, and exhibit sections are divided into the following age groups for Champion and Reserve Champion ribbon consideration. Age is determined as of January 1st of the participating year. No exhibitor in the Youth &4-HDepartment under the age of 8 will be allowed to show animals per Maryland State regulations.

Pee-Wee: ages - 6 to 7 years Division II: ages - 8 to 10 years Division III: ages - 14 to 18 years

- 4. The Fair Board and judges reserve the right to disqualify any exhibit not meeting fair show standards, or subdivide any classes as appropriate. All Youth exhibits must be show quality, exhibiting neatness, completeness, and a high grade of workmanship.
- 5. The age of the exhibitor will be considered by the judges.
- 6. THE DECISION OF THE JUDGES IS FINAL
- 7. All exhibits must have been made, grown or processed since last year's fair and must be the work of the exhibitor
- 8. Every animal and exhibit will be handled with appropriate care. Calvert County Fair, Inc. will not be responsible for any loss, damage, or accident that may occur. Locked display space will not be available for individual exhibits.
- 9. All adults and leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts and behavior. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Those who, by their actions, exhibit less than model behavior will be escorted from the premises at the discretion of the Fair Board or their representatives.

Youth Building

- 10. Entries will be received from 11:00am to 8:00pm on the Monday of Fair Week. In order to expedite the entry process, please arrive prior to 7:00pm if entering more than 10 items. NO entries will be received Tuesday morning in the Youth Department.
- 11. ONE ENTRYPER CLASS, unless otherwise noted.
- 12. The Danish system will be used for judging in the Youth Building.
- 13. All Youth exhibitors must have an entry number. Numbers may be obtained in the Youth building on entry day.
- 14. Champion and Reserve Champion ribbons are awarded only to Calvert County residents.
- 15. Entries are to be removed from the Youth building from 11:00am to 8:00pm on the Monday following the Fair. Any exhibitor removing entries prior to this time will forfeit premiums. Any exhibit not claimed will be discarded and the premium forfeited. All exhibitors are responsible for cleaning their display areas at the Fair's close.

Livestock

- 16. All purebred animals, percentage Boer goats, and recorded grade animals must have breed registration papers to be shown in purebred or percentage classes. All others will be shown as crossbred. Market animals may be either purebred or crossbred, no papers are necessary except market steers. Market steers must have registration papers or will be shown as crossbred. Copies of all papers should be sent in with fair registration.
- 17. All animals entered in the 4-HLivestock Shows must have been properly registered and recorded according to the rules by the established Divisions. Animals not properly registered will not be permitted in 4-H classes.
- 18. All livestock will be received on Tuesday from noon until 8:00 pm. Absolutely NO early or late arrivals.

- 19. Trailers/campers may NOT be parked inside the fairground gates without approved registration. Call the Fair Board Office at 410-535-0026 to register. SPACE IS LIMITED.
- 20. All 4H'ers exhibiting animal projects must have completed Animal Husbandry and Quality Assurance training. They must have also completed all 4-Henrollment requirements.
- 21. All livestock must meet the health requirements for the Maryland State Department of Agriculture and must have a valid health certificate. Health forms must be presented to the Livestock Superintendent or designees before animals are unloaded. Please see Health Requirements included in this fair book for complete information.
- 22. Once the animals have been checked by the Animal Health Inspector and unloaded, the exhibitor must check in with the Livestock Superintendent or designee for further direction.
- 23. All 4-HLivestock must be owned by the 4-Her and registered with their home county 4-Hoffice. AMaryland State 4-Hmarket eartag must be displayed on all market animals in 4-Hmarket classes.
- 24. All market lambs must be slick-shorn BEFORE they arrive on the fairgrounds. This is a mandated rule by the State of Maryland and no exceptions will be made. There will be no shearing of sheep on the premises.
- 25. The Calvert County Fair Board and/or the Livestock Superintendent reserve the right to refuse any entry they believe does not meet the intent of these requirements.
- 26. Weigh-in for market animals will be held on Wednesday evening at 6:00pm. Only Livestock Committee personnel, the exhibitor, and his/her family member(s) will be permitted at the scale during weigh-in
- 27. Market livestock will be divided into weight classes for judging.
- 28. Breeding animals are NOT permitted in market classes.
- 29. Each breed will be judged separately, per the discretion of the Livestock Superintendent.
- 30. The Livestock Superintendent reserves the right to cancel, combine, or alter any class they believe will enhance or better the Fair and livestock show.
- 31. All decisions of the Livestock Superintendent are final.
- 32. If there is any sign of illness or prolapse in an animal at any time during the Fair the animal will be sent home.
- 33. ALL4-Hand Youth exhibitors should wear khaki pants and a white collared shirt with a tie, bolo, or green ribbon. This includes safe, closed toed shoes. Soft shoes such as Crocs, and necklaces are NOT permitted. Exhibitors should wear a collared shirt, the livestock T-shirt provided by the Livestock Committee, or a club T-shirt. Pants, slacks, or jeans without holes may be worn. Long hair should be restrained for safety. No hats should be worn in the Show Ring. Jewelry should be kept to a minimum for safety.
- 34. Market Livestock, per species, must meet the minimum weight and not exceed the maximum weight as follows in order to be sold in the Livestock Auction.

Market SteerMarket GoatMarket LambMarket Swinemillimum 1,000 lbs.minimum 40 lbs.minimum 80 lbsminimum 200 lbsno maximumno maximumno maximummaximum 325 lbs.

- 35. The Livestock Committee reserves the right to allow tolerances for market weight.
- 36. The 4-H Grand Champion market animal in each species must be sold in the Livestock Auction on Saturday night regardless of the exhibitor's County.
- 37. The buyer will pay the full sales price for any animal sold in the auction to the Calvert County Livestock Auction Committee at the time of sale.
- 38. Thank you letters from the youth exhibitor to the buyers of all animals sold Saturday night in the auction must be turned in to the Livestock Superintendent or designee by Sunday at 5:00pm. Failure to turn in a thank you letter by the deadline will result in forfeited premiums and the possibility of not being able to sell in the next year's Calvert County Youth Livestock Auction.
- 39. The seller's information must be provided to the Calvert County Fair office to ensure prompt payment.
- 40. Calvert County 4-HExhibitors may offer a maximum of two market animals per species in the Auction. Youth from other Southern Maryland counties may offer one market animal per species in the Auction, except for Steers. Out of county Steers will only be offered for sale if they are the Grand Champion.
- 41. The mandatory federal check-off-fees are collected and paid by the Livestock Auction Committee.
- 42. Livestock will be released after 6:00pm on the Sunday of Fair week.
- 43. All pens, cattle areas, barns, and camper areas must be cleaned by Monday or premiums will be forfeited.

CATTLE

- 1. All market steers must be the property of the exhibitor by Jan. 1 of the current year and be tagged with a MD4-HMarket Livestock tag. Market steers must be born the year prior to exhibition.
- 2. All Cattle must have an official Radio Frequency ID Tag. (RFID). No Brands or tattoos accepted.
- 3. Breeding Heifers must be owned or leased by the exhibitor by June 1 of current year.
- 4. Market Steers must weigh a minimum of 1,000 lbs. in order to sell in the Livestock Auction. Out of county steers may only be offered for sale if they are the Grand Champion.
- 5. Steers and heifers must be dehorned and healed.
- 6. Exhibitors may show in only one showmanship class. Exhibitors must choose Beef or Dairy Showmanship.

SHOOP

- 1. All Sheep require scrapie identification. Registration tattoos/papers can be substituted for ear tags on breeding stock.
- 2. Market Lambs must be the property of the exhibitor by May 1st of current year and be tagged with a Maryland 4-H Market Livestock tag.
- 3. Breeding sheep must be owned or leased by the exhibitor by June 1st of the current year.
- 4. All Sheep should be shorn before arrival or shown in full fleece. Market lambs should be slick shorn before arrival.
- 5. Halters are not recommended in showmanship classes.
- 6. Market Lambs must weigh a minimum of 80 pounds in order to sell in the Livestock Auction.
- 7. Market Lambs must be born on or after January 1 of the current year.
- 8. Sheep shown in breeding classes are not eligible to show in a market class.

SWINE

- 1. Market Hogs must be the property of the exhibitor by June 1 of the current year.
- 2. Breeding swine must be owned or leased by June 1st.
- 3. All swine must have an official Radio Frequency ID tag (RFID). Ear notches or tattoos will not be accepted.
- 4. Market hogs must weigh a minimum of 200 pounds and a maximum of 325 pounds in order to sell in the Livestock Auction.
- 5. Gilts may be entered into a market class, but any gilt entered in breeding classes is not eligible for a market class.
- 6. Market Swine must be born on or after January 1st of the current year.
- 7. No boars/intact males may be shown.

GOATS

- 1. All Coats require scrapie identification. Registration/tattoos can be substituted for ear tags.
- 2. All breeding animals must be owned by the exhibitor by June 1 of current year.
- 3. Market Goats must be owned by the exhibitor by May 1 of the current year.
- 4. No intact males may be shown.
- 5. Horns should be tipped blunt.
- 6. All goats must have a collar or halter.
- 7. Does entered in a market class may not be shown in a breeding class.
- 8. Market goats must be born on or after January 1st of the current year.
- 9. Minimum market goat weight is 40lbs in order to sell in the Livestock Auction.
- 10. Exhibitors may show in only one Showmanship class. Exhibitors must choose either meat, dairy, or fiber showmanship.

- Boxes must be at least 5" x 8" and covered by glass or other transparent top.
- Insects of the same order should be grouped together.
- Specimens must be mounted on standard insect pins.
- New specimens should be identified by placing a straight pin with a colored head NEXTTO the new insect.

- Do NOT pin the insect with colored-head pins.
- Each collection must be accompanied by a printed index card identifying: Number of specimens in the collection, Number of orders in the collection, Number of specimens collected since last year's fair.
- Exhibitors may enter one general collection in the appropriate class and one collection in each specialty class.

General Classes





- All exhibits must relate to and promote 4-H.
- Use of the State 4-HTheme is optional.
- Copyrighted characters (SpongeBob, Bart Simpson, Superman, etc.) and trademarked items or logos (Coca-Cola, Nike, etc.) may not be used.
- Club entries must primarily be the work of club or members. Parents, leaders, teachers and advisors may supervise and assist with the design but may not do a significant portion of the construction.



SECTION A - 4-HOLUB BOOTH

- 1. 4-H Club Booth
- 2. Clover Club/School 4-HProgram Booth
- Club booths must exactly conform to size specifications.
- Exterior booth dimensions will be 36" width x 30" depth x 16" height.
 - The back of the booth must be 36"Wx 16"H

 - The sides must be in the shape of a right triangle.
- The booth must be constructed of wood or other durable material, and must be moveable.

- Nothing in the booth may be taller than the sides of the booth where the item is placed.
- Booth items should be securely fastened to the booth structure to prevent damage, loss, or shifting during movement.
- No electrical power will be provided; any moving features must be powered by battery.
- Booths MUST display the club name and at least one official 4-H Qover emblem in its design and notice of Equal Opportunity programs.
- An identification card must be securely attached to the front corner of the booth's bottom (as viewed from the front). The card should be 2 x 3.5 inches (business card size) and displayed horizontally. The club's name and county must be typewritten/computer printed on the card in font no smaller than 16 point. Identification cards may not be handwritten.



SECTION B - 4-H CLUB BANNER

The card should be 2 x 3.5 inches (business card size) and displayed horizontally. The club's name and county must be typewritten/computer printed on the card in font no smaller than 16 point. Identification cards may not be handwritten.

SECTION C – 4-H CLUB SCRAPBOOK

- Club scrapbooks must be created and assembled by club members, and should be a record of the club's activities for the current calendar year.
- The scrapbook may be any standard size, not to exceed 20" x 20".
- The club's name must be displayed on the front cover of the scrapbook.
- Scrapbooks must be securely fastened/bound, and must contain a minimum of five pages.
- Activities documented in the scrapbook must be identified and dated.
- All contents must be affixed within the book with NO protruding pages or items.

All horses will be subject to drug test, if necessary.

A Maryland Health Certificate must accompany animals to all shows and be presented upon request.

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For safety purposes, a special traffic pattern will be in effect from 10 am to 10 pm on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday of Fair Week. No vehicles will be allowed to turn left off of Rt 231 into the Fairgounds during those hours. An alternate route would be to use Rt. 506 (Sixes Road) to Rt. 508 (Adelina Road) to Rt. 231 which will allow a Right Turn into the Fairgrounds.

Once the Fairground Parking lots are full, Satellite Parking will be available at the College of Southern Maryland. Free Shuttle Bus Service will be available from CSM.

Additionally, once the parking lot is full, there will be an entrance for Vendors (**If space is avail able**) and Drop-off/Pick-up. This drop off will be the dirt road past the main entrance. There will be a sign posted at this entrance. Drop-off/Pick-up will turn in and turn immediately to the right. Once drop-off/pick-up has been completed, cars will be directed to exit the grounds. Vendors must have a pass to be admitted or will be directed to exit the grounds.
